






#### The Age Sample of this Survey


The Advocates' Liberator Online newsletter and the LP California list skewed the sample towards older libertarians. See Generational Divide opposite page.

#### Q3 In the last Presidential election, who did you vote for?




#### The Exit Question

#### The Lean of the Audience Sample and a Generational Divide

Libertarians above age 50 recall the fusion era. Ed Clark, Ed Crane, the Koch brothers, Ron Paul, and Harry Browne were all products of a time when Republicans were perceived to be for smaller government, free trade, constitutionalism, and balanced budgets. Libertarians considered committed conservatives their cousins.


That alliance started to crack up over the War on Iraq, big bank bailouts, and gay marriage, so that libertarians under 40 no longer share this perspective.











#### **Damascus Road**

#### Age plays a huge role in responses

Ayn Rand (deceased), Ron Paul (still living), Harry Browne (deceased), Neal Boortz (retired), and Robert Heinlein (deceased, science fiction writer) are people who've done a lot for our movement, but their times have passed. New figures will need to step up. Question 18, in our survey, starts seeking out those people.

## The Most Important Question

Q8 Very briefly describe the first circumstance that made you aware of libertarianism? Note: This is an event, and it's not necessarily when you became a libertarian.

Question 8 was open-ended - participants could write anything they wanted. For survey processors, this is messy. We painstakingly hand-sorted the answers, and it paid off with real insights.

#### **Top Five Answers...**

We organized and grouped the full answers. That document is 20 pages long! We were able to "group" the answers to find and rank the most common phrases and concepts. There were 122 different answers. Here were the Top 5 specific responses...

Ron Paul - 56
Libertarian acquaintance/family - 50
Ayn Rand - 43
Unrepresented by either major party - 34
World's Smallest Political Quiz/booth - 33

#### We categorized the 122 answers and ended up with 21 types of answers

We printed out all of the answers, generating a document 59 pages long! We tried to locate the key idea in each person's answer, but many people combined things. In response, we created an ad hoc point system so that we could rank the results and show them to you by Type in this simple format...

## The Most Interesting Part!

You can't necessarily see the most interesting insight in those results, but we could see it by reading every single answer.

## Call it an existential moment. The first time someone was exposed to libertarianism most commonly occurred during political campaign season.

- First, they might notice they didn't fit in with either party's candidate.
- Second and this one happened outside of election campaigns too in conversation, someone would tell them, "You sound like a libertarian."
- In both cases, they'd go on a personal journey, usually doing more research, and thereby discovering they really were a libertarian!



#### Who told them they were libertarians?

Teachers and family members told them about the libertarian alternative, especially their dads. People used the term dad, not father. And dear old dad was mentioned a surprising number of times.



#### It all starts with... Ron Paul

In individual responses, Ron Paul comes up more than any other person or thing. He defies category in our survey. Some read his books, saw his 1988 Libertarian campaign, or watched his special orders speeches on C-SPAN. But many recounted his 2007-08 and 2011-12 Presidential campaigns. Indeed, these two campaigns caused the largest swell of new libertarians ever. These people dug his long-term integrity, candor, and outsider status. They even went on to seek out free market and liberty-oriented works from Bastiat to Mises.


This question is about initial awareness. We ask how they became a libertarian in Question 12.

## **Keyword Results**


Our survey tool took the open-ended answers and measured two things: The number of times real words appeared in the answers and a relevance score - the words that seemed most important. Relevance separates out noise and gets to a more specific detail. For example, the system might count all the times the word "government" gets used, and even if that's many more times than the term "Ron Paul" appears, Ron would get a greater relevance score. A nice way to get a feel for how people responded is a "word cloud."




# How Are You Selling Libertarianism? What Do You Think Works?

What is the state of libertarian outreach? Are libertarians sharing the message? If so, how much? What is the setting for their outreach? And what are they saying and is it working?


#### Q15 Do you tell others that you're a libertarian?

This is our second hand-sorted question. Most of the 756 answers were assigned to one category, receiving one point. But there were answers assigned to two categories, receiving a half-point each.

Additionally, "No pitch" is an interesting category with a score of 46.5. It can mean "I don't have a pitch." It can also mean that I think "pitching" is un-libertarian. Relatedly, there was a specific category devoted to people who wanted to build common ground first, with a score of 27.5.





#### Q19 The biggest external challenge confronting libertarians is...






# Q20 Have you persuaded anyone to become a libertarian who started off with another political philosophy?




